Courses and Activities



Researching Knockbain Heritage

Mondays, 1st Sept for 6 weeks, 7-9:30pm Allangrange Arms, Munlochy (function room) An opportunity to research sites and buildings of interest in Knockbain Parish on the Black Isle, share memories and create a display or leaflet. All welcome, whether you have come to previous sessions or not. Free.

Learn about and research Telford's roads, bridges and churches in the Kyle of Sutherland. All welcome, whether you have come to previous sessions or not.

2) Creating a Display

Thursdays 2nd October for 5 weeks, 7-9:30pm Bonar Bridge Community Hall



Final research and then we'll create a display describing Telford's impact in the area. All welcome, whether you have come to previous sessions or not.

3) Creating a Leaflet describing Telford's impact in the area

Thursdays 6th November for 4 weeks Bonar Bridge Community Hall, 7-9:30pm Pulling together all the work from the year, we'll create a leaflet showcasing Telford's work in the area.

4) Surveying Telford's Bridges

Saturday & Sunday 27th & 28th September, 10-4 This is an opportunity to learn how to record standing buildings of all sorts, led by Janet Hooper. The Saturday and Sunday morning will involve observing, sketching, photographing, and detailed accurate recording of an unrecorded Telford bridge. On Sunday afternoon we'll take a tour of Telford and contemporary bridges. No previous experience needed. Free, but **booking is essential.** If you need transport, let us know and we will arrange car share.

ARCH will also be at the Invercharron Games on 20th September. Come and find out more about the project.

Exploring Telford's Archives

Tuesdays 21st October for four weeks, 1-4pm Highland Archive Centre, Bught Road, Inverness, IV3 5SS

Learn how to use the Highland Archives, and explore documents relating to the work of Thomas Telford in the Highlands. Funded by Historic Scotland.

Open Source GIS Workshops

Tuesdays, 11th Nov for 5 weeks, 7-9:30pm. Alness Heritage Centre (Wallace Room)

Malcolm Standring will provide hands-on instruction on using Open Source GIS software, allowing you to geo-reference maps and combine map information with a database. Basic computing knowledge needed, but the course assumes no previous knowledge of GIS systems. Bring your own laptop, or there will be some extra for using on the course.

Telford on the Sleat Peninsula

Ancient Craft Courses coming soon!

We have just heard that the successful Ancient Craft courses have received another round of funding from High Life Highland and will be taking place in Nairn and Tain. During the 4 day course Lynne McKeggie will teach 4 different ancient crafts and explore the archaeological evidence for each one: including braiding, tablet weaving, and naal binding (a kind of Viking knitting).

Telford's Bridges in the Kyle of Sutherland

Gateway to Inverness: Telford and WWII

Monday 29th September, 2-3

A walk looking at a forgotten gateway to Inverness at Stoneyfield, with wartime barriers and a Thomas Telford-era tollhouse. Take the A96 east from Inverness. Just after the second roundabout, turn left (signpost Milton of Culloden) and go under the railway bridge to the T-junction for roadside parking (NH 7056 4670).



Wartime Invergordon

Thursday 2nd October, 1:30-4:30 Join Allan Kilpatrick of RCAHMS and Susan Kruse of ARCH to explore wartime remains from WWI and WWII in Invergordon. Part of ARCH's Recording Walks series. Meet outside Invergordon Parish Church (NH 7075 6875).

A Walk Around Spinningdale

Tuesday 7th October, 2-3:30

Susan Kruse will lead this walk for the Woodland Trust, exploring remains from the industrial age and other sites linked with the heritage around Ledmore and Midgale Woods. Come to learn and share information. Meet at junction A949 and Migdale road. There is very limited parking on the lane across from the Migdale road junction towards the Firth. Please carshare if possible.

Recording walk: Munlochy

Thursday 9th October, 2-3:30pm

An easy walk sharing memories and information about the village of Munlochy. Part of ARCH's Recording Walks series. Much of the walk is suitable for wheelchairs. Meet at Munlochy Village car park.





Project Activities Telford in the Kyle of Sutherland

The project continued over the summer with a series of well-attended walks and fieldtrips. A small group also investigated milestones on Telford roads.

In July a large group met at the Mound near Golspie where Bruce Field provided background and fascinating insights into the repairs and workings of these innovative sluice gates which Telford built. The following week, we explored Croick Church and manse, one of Telford's parliamentary churches in the Highlands and Islands.

The project will now begin to research Telford's remains in earnest, working towards preparing a display and leaflet. Details of courses and survey days s can be found elsewhere in the newsletter and on the ARCH website.

Knockbain Heritage

The Knockbain Heritage project has recorded information about over 80 sites, many of them previously unrecorded. Over the summer there were two walks. At Munlochy a large group ambled along the road, sharing memories and stories about houses and structures. A large group also visited Kilmuir, looking at finds from the Middle Ages to World War II. John McDonald brought a display formerly produced for a North Kessock & District Local History Society exhibition, which was reassembled in a steading, showing how much can change in even a short time.

The Knockbain Heritage project will reconvene in September, where participants will have a chance to research areas of interest, share more memories, and to help produce either a leaflet or display. All are welcome, whether they have been involved before. Details in the newsletter or on the ARCH website.

Feats of Clay Finale

Previous newsletter articles have highlighted the exciting Feats of Clay project, organised by the North Kessock and District Local History Society, with input on courses from ARCH. The results of the project exploring Bronze Age metalworking in the Moray Firth will be showcased at the Society's free one-day exhibition at North Kessock Village Hall on Saturday 6th September, 10:30-4:30. There will be displays, workshops including pottery and woodworking, children's crafts and metal detecting, and much more.
