## Highland Archaeology Festival

ARCH is pleased to announce that it is now organising the Highland Archaeology Festival on behalf of the Highland Council. This year it runs from 1-16<sup>th</sup> October, with the 'What's New in Highland Archaeology Conference' taking place on 15<sup>th</sup> & 16<sup>th</sup> October. Working with the Historic Environment Team, we are planning a number of new ventures including:

- a keynote speaker to launch the conference on the 30<sup>th</sup> of September – this year Richard Oram will look at medieval Highlands.
- a keynote speaker on Friday, 14<sup>th</sup> October – this year Rod McCullagh talking on Reflections of Lairg.
- an afternoon of workshops on Friday 14<sup>th</sup> October at Council Headquarters
- a dedicated website to launch soon: [www.highlandarchaeologyfestival.org](http://www.highlandarchaeologyfestival.org)
- an artefact trail of HAF 2016 objects, with a passport to record visits

## Self-Guided Trails for the Summer

If you are planning a day trip or a holiday in the Highlands over the summer there are a number of self-guided walks or field trips available. ARCH has produced a number including:



- Walk around Strathpeffer (leaflets from Strathpeffer Community Centre, Old Pump Room, Highland Museum of Childhood, or online from ARCH website)
- Invergordon World War I trail (leaflets from Invergordon Museum)
- A walk around Munloch (leaflet from ARCH website and possibly locally).

- Evanton Airfield Past and Present (available from Cornerstone Café and ARCH website)
- Heritage Along the Kyle Line (available from ARCH website and Dingwall Station). The leaflet shows heritage remains along the rail journey.
- Telford in the Kyle of Sutherland (available from Kyle of Sutherland Development Trust). A trail by car.

ARCH is currently compiling a list of other self-guided trails. If you have produced one, please send details of web information and also where printed copies can be found. Similarly there are a growing number of digital apps trails including Strathpeffer and TimeSpan.

## Project Reports

### Remembering the Strathpeffer Area



The project investigating the heritage of the Strathpeffer Area finished in spring 2016. Over 400 records were submitted to the Historic Environment Record, and once they have been given numbers there, will also be forwarded to Canmore. A full sites listing is available now from the ARCH website, with paper copies at the Strathpeffer Community Centre, Old Pump Room, Highland Museum of Childhood and Dingwall Library. Full archives of information can be found at the Community Centre, Museum and Pump Room. Remembering the Strathpeffer Area was a joint project with Strathpeffer Community Centre, funded by the Heritage Lottery Fund and Mackenzie New York Villa Trust.

## Exploring Strathpeffer Station

We were delighted when the Highland Museum of Childhood asked ARCH to facilitate sessions to research Strathpeffer old station and help produce interpretative panels.

From February to May 2016 participants met to share memories, look at archives and photographs,

and discover the history of the station from its building in 1884 up to today. The research was in advance of building works on the canopy, after which the three signboards written by the group will be erected. The results of the research are also being published as a blog from the [Highland Museum of Childhood website](#) which will also record the building works once they commence. A

leaflet about the station is also in preparation. Some surprises from the project were the rediscovery of the film which showed at the cinema in the station in the 1980, and recording of some of the many original fenceposts – metal and wood – and bridges which survive.



## Home Front Legacy Training

In this joint event with ARCH, CBA, Archaeology Scotland and Historic Environment Scotland held in February, participants had talks about World War I activities in the Cromarty Firth by Allan Kilpatrick and Susan Kruse of ARCH, and then had training in how to use a new app to record wartime remains. The practical session on the Sunday looked at remains at Dalmore, and using old photographs and archive information was able to record a surviving wartime building.



## On-Line Heritage Explorations

ARCH held two further On-Line Heritage Explorations funded by High Life Highland, at Ardersier and Invergordon.



We explored old maps, heritage databases, aerial photographs on-line, family history website, and any other computing topic of interest, including file organisation, powerpoint and the wonders of the snipping tool. We grappled with multiple operating systems and platforms (tablets and laptops) as well as the ScotlandsPeople voucher system, but everyone gained new skills and we were able to submit information and photos to both the HER and Canmore. There was more than enough to fill five sessions. The fantastic map archive of the National Archives of Scotland ([maps.nls.uk](#)) was a real favourite.

### Friends Visit

ARCH Friends had a fascinating day in May visiting sites in Strathglass. We started



with a visit to the 19<sup>th</sup> century Chisholm graveyard, probably on the site of an earlier motte. Overgrown and atmospheric, the cemetery had splendid examples of Celtic revival tombstones. We then walked over to Erchless Castle, a well-preserved tower house castle with later additions. After a lunch we visited Eskadale Church, built by the Frasers of Castle Beaufort. Our final stop of the day was an enigmatic vitrified hillfort at Fionn Dun. Thanks to Roland Spencer-Jones for organising a splendid trip.

### Valerie Reid

We regret to note the untimely death of Valerie Reid, a longtime ARCH supporter and Friend. After many years working in Dingwall Library, on retirement Valerie turned to heritage pursuits in earnest. With Maureen Grey she wrote and produced a series of quirky walk leaflets highlighting Dingwall heritage. (These are available at Dingwall Museum and Library amongst other venues). More recently with ARCH she was involved with developing the Querns project. She will be missed very much.
