Winter Courses and Lectures

Kiltearn Old Kirk



ARCH will be running a number of courses for the Evanton Community Trust's project to research Kiltearn Old Kirk.

Surprisingly little is known about the striking ruin on the shore, yet for centuries this was the parish church for Kiltearn.

Over the next year there will be a number of activities, including researching old documents, conducting a graveyard survey (which has not been done before), learning how to do family history searches, and then researching various people associated with the kirk and parish, conducting a standing building survey, and pulling it all together for a signboard to be erected on the site.

The first activities during these cold months will be exploring documents relating to the kirk and parish. Some are in books, some on the internet, and some in private archives and in the Highland Archive Centre in Inverness. The first four meetings will be on Mondays, 23rd January – 13th February, 7-9:30pm at Cornerstone Café in Evanton. At these sessions we'll then set times to explore other archives. 25th Jan: '**A summer on Hirta - working as the St Kilda Archaeologist**'

Jonathan Wordsworth of the NTS describes his work on St Kilda.

22nd Feb: '**Rosemarkie Caves, some finds and a puzzle**'

Simon Gunn provides an account of 10 years of archaeology in coastal caves near Rosemarkie, including the latest in September 2016.

29th Mar: '**The Prehistory of Skye: An overview including the results of recent archaeological discoveries**'

Steven Birch summarises recent work including some important landscape surveys, evaluations and excavations over the past couple of decades.

26th Apr: '**Highland Vernacular Buildings**'

Malcolm Bangor-Jones provides an introduction to vernacular buildings as they developed with changes in economy and society and with new construction techniques and materials.



31st May: '**Excavations at Dun Deardail: the analysis of a north-western vitrified fort**'

Martin Cook describes the first two seasons of excavation at the spectacular vitrified hill fort of Dun Deardail in Lochaber.

28th June: '**Discoveries at Tornagrain**'

Lachlan McKeggie will cover the main findings excavations at this prehistoric site near Inverness, including post-excavation results.

Project Updates

Highland Archaeology Festival

ARCH organised HAF this year for the first time on behalf of Highland Council. There were a number of new initiatives, including keynote talks, workshops, a museum trail, a dedicated website and online booking for the conference. All were well-received with the exception of the museum trail. Lessons were learned, and good feedback received – but if you have any other thoughts about next year’s festival, email/write us as planning starts next month!

ARCH also offered its usual variety of events of walks, talks, displays and even a pub quiz this year.



Invergordon in World War II

A dedicated group has been meeting in Invergordon since June, remembering and researching remains of Invergordon from World War II in sessions run by ARCH on behalf of Invergordon Museum. In September participants pulled together information to create a display which was launched during the HAF festival. Over a hundred people came to the launch and for a walk around the town. The information is now being assembled for submitting to the HER and Canmore (over 900 sites!) and for a booklet. The sessions were so popular that an informal local heritage group has been formed, meeting on the first Thursday of every month, 7-9pm at Invergordon Museum (2nd Thursday in January) – all welcome!



Courses relating to Telford in the Highlands

Unfortunately ARCH was unable to get match funding for its Highland-wide Telford project. As a result, we have broken it down into smaller segments. Previous courses looked at Telford in the Kyle of Sutherland (funded by E.ON Rosehall Community Fund and The Robertson Trust) and Telford on the Sleat Peninsula (funded by Historic Scotland).



A session on using Telford Archives was run in 2014, also funded by Historic Scotland. This proved so popular and essential for any work on Telford, that it was repeated in November/December 2016. Thirteen people met to explore various archives relating to Telford – and managed to get sidetracked looking at other areas as well. The Highland Archive Centre was very accommodating to a group working together – and we found this an exciting and fruitful way to explore archives, as participants all helped fellow researchers whenever they discovered something of interest.

At the same time, a course devoted to exploring Telford’s impact in Badenoch and Strathspey, funded by Historic Environment Scotland, began meeting in November in Grantown Museum, looking at various sources available. The sessions continue until March – all welcome (see page 2).

Strathpeffer Station

ARCH ran a number of sessions for Highland Museum of Childhood researching the old station. The panels which participants helped write have now been installed. The work of the group was showcased at a HAF event run by ARCH, with a walk down some of the old railway line followed by looking at the work assembled by participants, and watching the film commissioned by Alister Brebner when the building was a cinema. Final sessions at the end of 2016 included a workshop on how to edit websites and blogs, and a celebration of the results.
