Highland Archaeology Festival 2019

One of the high points each year is undoubtedly the HAF festival, featuring over 100 events and exhibitions in a packed three weeds. As usual, ARCH is involved in a number of events:



Monday 30th September, 1:30-3:30pm HERO Day: Contributing to Our Heritage Knowledge

Bring photographs and information to this drop in session at Culloden Library, and we will help you add them to the Highland Historic Environment Record, Highland Council's database of all known heritage. Scanner and computers available, and opportunities to explore this fantastic resource.



Thursday 3rd October, 10-4pm

The Northern Barrage in the Highlands

Free, one-day conference on the U.S. Navy activity in the Highlands in World War I, assembling and then deploying mines on the Northern Barrage between Orkney and Norway. Various community groups which have researched the topic will present their findings of this little known presence. Spectrum Centre, Inverness (near the bus station). Bookings to ARCH.

Thursday 3rd October, 4-7pm

The Northern Barrage in the Highlands: exhibition Browse displays created by groups from Inverness, Ardersier, the Black Isle, Alness, Invergordon and Strathpeffer. Spectrum Centre, Inverness.

Lecture by Allan Kilpatrick discussing all aspects of the operations required in the creation of the Northern Barrage, pulling together findings of the conference and placing them in context. Spectrum Centre, Inverness. Free, no booking needed.

Wartime Remains at the North Sutor and Nigg

A Walk Around Ashaig

Join John MacLeod for a walk around the multiperiod site of Ashaig near Broadford on Skye, looking at prehistoric roundhouse, burnt mound and shell middens, the chapel site with holy well, a preaching site and a limekiln. Meet at Ashaig cemetery car park. During HAF, finds from excavations at the well be on display at the Skye & Lochalsh Archive Centre in Portree.



Tuesday 8th October, 1:30-3:30

A Guided Visit to Dunrobin Castle Museum

Join Susan Kruse of ARCH for a guided visit to the wonderful museum in the grounds of Dunrobin Castle. This hidden gem includes an important collection of prehistoric finds and Pictish stones. The free event is only to the museum, and anyone wishing to visit the castle and grounds will need to purchase entry tickets. Bookings essential to ARCH.

Project Reports

Highland Regional ScARF

Grace has been busy over the summer continuing to input and revise data in the Highland Historic Environment Record. Thanks to a grant from the Pilgrim Trust, she is now adding information about Highland finds, gathering information from museum catalogues and collections, Treasure Trove information, and other sources. The ScARF project is funded by Historic Environment Scotland via Society of Antiquaries of Scotland.

Experimental Archaeology

We are on the homeward stretch of this project now, with teacher Dave Peers and archaeologists Lachlan & Lynne McKeggie working together to produce learning materials to accompany the loan boxes. Thanks to the generosity of workshop leaders, the project has produced 4 loan boxes. These will be ready by end of October to be borrowed by schools, community groups, libraries or other interested people. The project is funded by Historic Environment Scotland and the Heritage Lottery Fund.



Dalmore Wartime Remains

The Dalmore Wartime Remains project had a very successful launch to its display on 18th June, with over 100 people attending. Information about the project can be found on the ARCH website. The group will also present its results at the Northern Barrage conference during HAF. The project was funded by the Port of Cromarty Firth and Orion Group, with additional support from ARCH, Invergordon Museum and Alness Heritage Centre.



Friends Trip June 2019

As thanks to ARCH Friends, we arrange a special trip each year. This year we visited Ardersier. We first stopped at Fort George, where we were guided around the Highlanders' Museum, and saw dolphins from the ramparts. Then we had lunch at the PACE café and heritage centre, looking at their displays and resources.
