Family Heritage Day

In March ARCH was involved in organising a Highland Heritage Day, where many local organisations and museums had stalls promoting their activities. It was an exciting day, with lots of networking and discussions of common concerns and opportunities. There was also a request to have a similar day open to the public, so that people of all ages could see the

range of museums, heritage groups, and local heritage projects in the Highlands.



ARCH is organising the Family Heritage Day at Dingwall Academy and Dingwall Library on Saturday 23rd September, 10 to 4pm, with help from a steering group from NoSAS, Museums and Heritage Highland, Highland Archaeology Services and Wardlaw Mausoleum. This is a drop in event, which will have a range of activities on offer including children's activities, craft stalls, guided walks and talks on a variety of topics. The day is free and no booking necessary. Plenty to do!

This will launch the Highland Archaeology Festival for this year. The programme of activities for the day will be posted on the <u>HAF website</u> when all details are finalised, or will be available on the day, in case you want to plan your visit around certain activities.

Tuesday 26th September 11:30am-1:00pm Chambered Cairns of the Black Isle: The Temple, near Tore


Learn about chambered cairns in the Highlands as we explore this much-disturbed large cairn.

North Talisker: A Land Fit for Heroes

Exhibition at Skye and Lochalsh Archive Centre until end of September, to mark and celebrate the centenary of the repeopling of North Talisker. Families from Harris, Lewis, and some areas of Skye began arriving as part of the planned repopulation, taking possession of crofting tenancies on 68 new holdings created through the Land Resettlement Act 1919. The exhibition features archives and contributions from local community projects such as unseen archival footage and new oral histories.

Norwegians in the Highlands in World War II

After Norway was occupied in WWII, the government was in exile in Britain, and Norwegian troops were billeted and trained



throughout the Highlands. In other ARCH projects we have encountered snippets of information. Clearly there is a story to be told, and one of our Board members, Carolyn Samsin, has been in contact with some Norwegians researching the story from their end. There is plenty of opportunity for international collaboration and investigation of Highland archives and sites. If you have any information or contacts, or would like to be involved, we'd love to hear from you.

The Impact of Fishing around Golspie.

The heritage of the fishing communities in the Highlands is a multi-period topic, combining strands of oral history, physical remains and historical




sources. This project will be a pilot focussing on the Golspie area, collaborating with the Golspie Heritage Society. Lessons learned will then help us see about rolling this out to other communities in the Highlands.
