ARCH's 1st Anniversary

ARCH has celebrated its first year of operation! What a lot has been achieved this past year! Four Community Timeline courses, 3 Pathways into the Past courses (almost halfway along the route now!), 1 Display the Past course and another due to start in January, 2 courses along the Kyle line, oral history courses on the Black Isle and in Strathpeffer, 11 Insight/On site guided tours, open meetings in 3 communities, lectures given to groups and classrooms, and a film and lecture series launched, as was our website with heritage events and information, and much more. ARCH is also providing courses for the Boblainy Forest Archaeology Project and for the Workers' Educational Association, and we are involved in plans with other groups who are planning community archaeology projects.

There's much more planned for the coming year – see the events listing in this newsletter or the website for the first offerings. We are always happy to hear from people. Is there a course you want in your area? Can we help with your local project? Is there a mystery site or find near you that you'd like highlighted on the website? We are driven by you – so tell us what you would like!

Highland Rock Art

Susan Kruse reflects on sites still to be found...

Many people think that all the important sites have been found, and that only below ground archaeology has the potential to add to our knowledge. Wrong! There are plenty of above ground remains still to be discovered and recorded, and the Highland Council Archaeology Unit is regularly adding new sites to its HER database (many in fact supplied from ARCH!).

I can provide a personal story to illustrate. Near where I stay there are a number of marked paths. I was walking past one for the umpteenth time a few years ago about this time of year, with glorious, low raking sunshine (and no snow!), and there, right beside the path, was

the fine cup and ring marked stone illustrated here. It is a beauty, with a large number of cup marks, some with rings pecked out around them, and some linked by lines. Inspired, I



searched the area and found another cup marked boulder. Shortly afterwards John and Trina Wombell had a walk in the area and found another two.

In a short period of time we then had four new finds of these enigmatic stones, in an area where previously only one had been known. John has since gone on to set up a project investigating the rock art in Easter Ross and has more than doubled the known corpus in a year. John will be giving the next ARCH lecture on *Prehistoric Rock Art in the Scottish Highlands*, on **Monday 31**st **January, 7:30** at Dingwall Community Centre. He welcomes your input – on stones you may have seen in your area or ideas about these interesting finds. Don't miss this interesting session!

Remembering Strathpeffer

ARCH's Black Isle Heritage Memories project was very successful, generating new information about sites, buildings and features, and much excitement in the sessions. Many lessons were learned, and outlined in our booklet 'Black Isle Heritage Memories: Remembering Your Community' (copies still available from the ARCH office). Following on from this, ARCH received funding from Generations Working Together (part of the Scottish Centre for Intergenerational Practice) to hold some sessions in Strathpeffer. Despite the weather, a number people met before Christmas to share memories of sites and buildings in this community with its very unusual history. Using old maps, photographs (some more than a century old), a detailed sales prospectus from the mid 20th century, and memories spanning over 80 years, we have gathered information to update or add to over 60 records in the HER. Some pupils from the school have joined us, looking on in amazement at the excitement and enthusiasm in the room, and mesmerised by tales of bank deliveries and shop robberies. We will have our final session in January and expect to add even more to the tally.

Living in the Past

ARCH will be working with Brian Wilkinson, Education Officer with the Scotland's Rural Past project, exploring a croft site at Heights of Kilcoy near Tore with local school children and Young Archaeologist Clubs on 25th and 26th March. There are also places available for teachers who would like to explore how to use sites of this nature (plentiful in the Highlands!) in their classes – an ideal curriculum for excellence project. Picture the Past: Dornoch to Tain

31st January: **Prehistoric Rock Art in the Scottish Highlands**

John Wombell will look at examples of rock art from around the Highlands and elsewhere in Britain, and consider what this most enigmatic phenomenon can tell us about prehistoric people.

28th Feb: *Historic Landscapes of the Highlands*

Allan Kilpatrick from the RCAHMS will explain how the landscapes of the Highlands have come into being and how the history of the Highlands can be explored by looking at its landscape.

28th March: *Birsay - political and religious* power centre in Orkney. A retrospective look at 75 years' investigation

Prof. Chris Morris will look back at over 75 years' work on the Brough of Birsay, a notable Pictish and Norse site on Orkney, drawing together archive and unpublished work of Dr Ralegh Radford, and excavations and surveys which have taken place over the years, including many by himself.

Simon Gunn will describe a community dig at Caird's Cave, Rosemarkie last year which investigated the history of the cave where Dr William MacLean excavated almost 100 years ago.
